DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The 2022-23 fiscal year has brought with it a number of successes relating to PEERS Alliance's mission. We have increased our capacity to provide education, engagement, and support for the communities we serve. While our province is facing many challenges of wealth inequity, shortage and affordability of housing, and rising addictions and a toxic drug supply, PEERS Alliance has increased our work to support some of the most vulnerable PEI residents to build healthier, inclusive communities and to end stigma surrounding sexual health and drug use using a trauma-informed approach.

We have been able to increase our supports to Island residents outside of Charlottetown! A new satellite office in Summerside has a focus on 2SLGBTQ+ youth programming. The Youth Program Coordinator team has grown to three staff, and we have seen a significant increase in the number of youth attending our programming. With the help of dedicated volunteers, we have been able to resume 2SLGBTQ+ youth programming in Montague. The Rural Outreach Project also kicked off and continues to provide harm reduction supplies and education to and through peer leads in all three counties.

The Charlottetown Street Outreach project hired a second Street Outreach Worker. This project provides harm reduction initiatives out of the Community Outreach Centre including the satellite expansion of the provincial needle exchange program. We also engaged a staff role of Men's Sexual Health Coordinator. In the final months of the 2022-23 fiscal year, we signed an agreement with the province to operate the first provincial Overdose Prevention Site and started work on a five year project to support trans youth, adults, and their families.

The effectiveness of PEERS Alliance's work this year has benefited enormously from the high esteem of the community and provincial employees and policy makers. We anticipate the next fiscal year will include additional growth for the organization.

Our communities emotional, financial, and practical support requirements have only increased with these challenges. PEERS Alliance has, under the steady and capable leadership of our Executive Director, Josie Baker, not only managed to stay afloat to continue serving our community and partners, but to grow and expand in meaningful ways to better serve and support our community.

PEERS Alliance has continued to run our existing programming for queer and trans children, youth, families, and adults; as well as expanding into new programs and locations to serve more demographics and more geographic locations. We also continue to advocate for and help create increased access to and education about harm reduction services.

It has been my privilege to serve alongside all the other directors of the Board as the Chairperson over the last year and to work with the staff of PEERS Alliance. I would like to thank those who have volunteered with the organization in various capacities over the last year for their time and energy. PROGRAM DIRECTOR'S REPORT

With strong stakeholder support and engagement, PEERS Alliance continued to grow and develop much needed health promotion and harm reduction programming developed with, by, and for the communities we served in PEI over the 2022 – 2023 fiscal year.

Thanks to committed volunteers, our dedicated and growing staff provided programming with over 80 2SLGBTQ+ youth through the PEI Rainbow Club, Writing Club, and the expansion of the much-loved family focused Roots and Shoots program. PEERS Alliance staff also continued to support equity and inclusion efforts through educational initiatives with the Public Schools Branch and Department of Education, reaching hundreds of students. Additionally, over 250 2SLGBTQ+ adults accessed support via systems navigation services, peer support initiatives, and social event programming such as the Adult Drop-in, the Nutrition Program, Buds, and events delivered over Pride week and throughout the year.



PEERS Alliance experienced increased demand for harm reduction and outreach services. All Island residents are contending with challenges related to inflation, housing costs, and health care accessibility, but community members living on the margins have been the most impacted by these issues. Last year, Charlottetown Street Outreach staff reported 1,981 health promotion and harm reduction interactions with almost 200 unique individuals in need of services and support. Through the peer-lead Rural Outreach Project, our 6 peer leads reached an additional 150 people in need of harm reduction services and support outside of Charlottetown. With an increasingly toxic supply, PEERS Alliance harm reduction staff have worked with the community to distribute and educate consumers on overdose prevention, distributing 850 fentanyl test strips and 500+ naloxone kits.

As we look forward, we have identified opportunities to advance our mission and vision through collaborative efforts with partner agencies and other stakeholders. We are excited to join the Homeless Individual and Families Information System (HIFIS) through work the Department of Housing, Land and Communities; we are thrilled to be increasing access to STBBI testing by introducing Dried Blood Spot Testing through our Men's Sexual Health Coordinator position and their work with the CBRC and the Department of Health and Wellness and Health PEI; and we are very much looking forward to opening PEI's first Overdose Prevention Site with support from a host of folks represented on the Community Harm Reduction Steering Committee!

HIRED 7 NEW STAFF

This year, we expanded our team and were thrilled to welcome more folks for harm reduction and 2SLGBTQ+ programming, including an additional Street Outreach Worker to meet demand.




CAMP ASPEN - A 2SLGBTQ+ CAMP

We held the first 2SLGBTQ+ youth summer camp on PEI! Camp Aspen had an attendance of 26 youth and will continue in 2023.



SIGNED A CONTRACT TO OPERATE THE OVERDOSE PREVENTION SITE

We offered a response to the Request for Proposals for an operator of a provincial Overdose Prevention Site and ultimately signed a contract to run the OPS.



CELEBRATED WORLD AIDS DAY

We celebrated World Aids Day on December 1, 2022 at City Cinema in partnership with Dave Stewart to show the documentary *POSITIVE: When HIV/AIDS Hit PEI* with a crowd of over 60 people!

HIRED A SOCIAL WORKER

We were able to hire a Social Worker, Henry Luyombya, to be able to directly reach and assist the trans community.

QUEER MOVEMENT RETREAT

Hosted a community retreat for folks in the 2SLGBTQ+ community with a goal to give space to queer folks in the community to build knowledge about what 2SLGBTQ+ advocacy is needed in PEI, while providing facilitated sessions for in-person community building.



SUPPORTED COMMUNITY THROUGH HURRICANE FIONA AND RELIEF EFFORTS

We were able to support vulnerable community members through FIONA relief efforts, including dedicating staff resources to support the delivery of pop-up shelters, visiting known encampments to provide wellness checks and offer transportation, engaged community members in encampment clean up efforts, and more.

INCREASED ACCESS TO HARM REDUCTION MATERIALS AND INFO IN RURAL COMMUNITIES

Thanks to our Peer Lead Coordinator, Lauren Sheidow, we engaged 11 people who use(d) drug in five training and capacity building sessions to deliver peer-led harm reduction outreach within their personal networks.



QUEER YOUTH WRITING CLUB

With a new partnerships with the PEI Writers' Guild, we were able to create a new program: the Queer Youth Writing Club! With a consistent 10 youth attending, this writing club will be publishing an anthology of queer youth writing with Acorn Press.



FUND DIVERSIFICATION

PROVINCIAL FUNDING

The 2022 - 2023 budget year was the second of three years that PEERS Alliance is to receive \$250,000 from the Department of Health and Wellness (DHW). The Department of Social Development and Housing has also offering significant support for an active partnership on street outreach and direct support initiatives. This commitment marks a tremendous moment in time for PEERS Alliance and we are incredibly grateful to the PEI Government for believing in us and the work we do all across Prince Edward Island.

CAPACITY BUILDING

We continued our work on the capacity building project from WAGE and worked on implementing the goals in our strategic plan. This included executing a community forum where board and staff of Pride PEI, PEI Transgender Network, and PEERS Alliance were able to gather and plan together.

Additionally, we have developed internal policies as part of the capacity building project this budget year, which help to streamline internal processes and understanding among employees and contract staff.

We have also explored social enterprise activities, such as community workshops and inclusivity training, which earned PEERS Alliance \$11,000 in offering these workshops for other nonprofits, businesses, and government agencies.






It has been heartwarming to see youth supporting one another to create a much needed peer group that normalizes - and celebrates - queerness! Every QYC night the youth carve out a unique space where it is safe and encouraged to exist authentically, without fear of confrontation by any youth, adults who are less than respectful, understanding, tolerant and accepting of diverse 2SLGBTQIA+ experiences, identities and issues.

Beyond the safe space where youth support and celebrate one another, it has been really amazing to see youth work through tough but important questions and topics together at QYC through the weekly talk it out activity. It's great to see youth bringing up the challenges they face or questions they have in this context with trusted peers and some adult guidance, rather than say by going down lonely, scary and misleading internet rabbit holes. Or rather than harbouring 2SLGBTQIA+ related challenges they've faced and trying to cope and process these experiences on their own, without support.

I wish there was a QYC when I was a teen 10 years ago! I'm so glad PEERS Alliance is able to facilitate this group today.


An aspect of [the] seminar that really resonated with me was: Harm Reduction = Self Love. That was a very powerful awareness for me.
